C. H. LANGENBACH DIES YESTERDAY

Prominent Hardware Merchant Here Many Years

Hugo Langenbach, 66, a resident of Clarence his entire life and a prominent business man here for many years, died at his home at 3:20 o'clock yesterday morning after having been in ill health since, April, 1944, at which time he suffered a stroke of paralysis. During a greater part of his illness he was bedfast and since last April he had been unable to be up and about at all.
