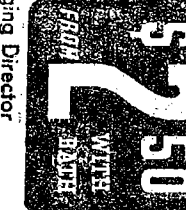

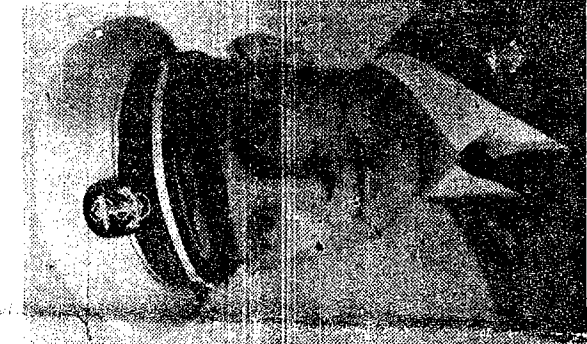
MRS. MAMIE YANCEY
