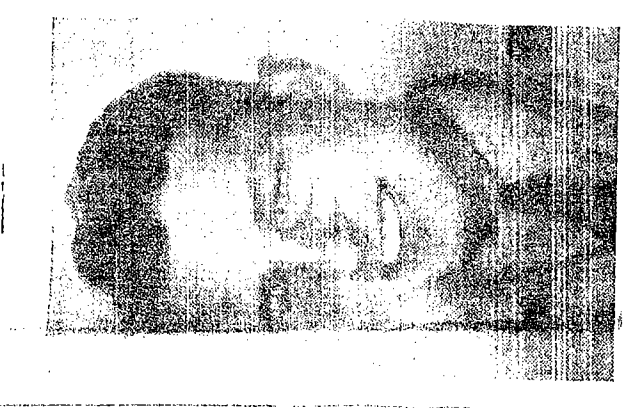

SERVING AS TAIL GUNNER ON B-24 LIBERATOR



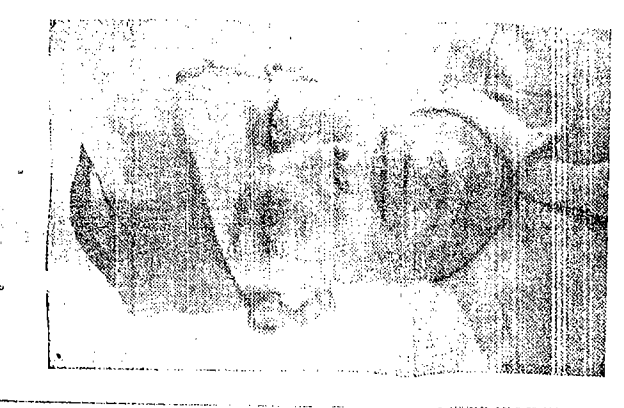
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CPL. H. SUBKE IS WOUNDED

SERVING AS COMBAT ENGINEER IN 3RD. ARMY



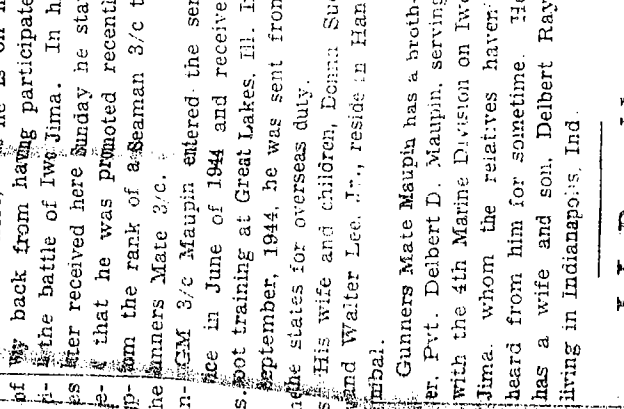

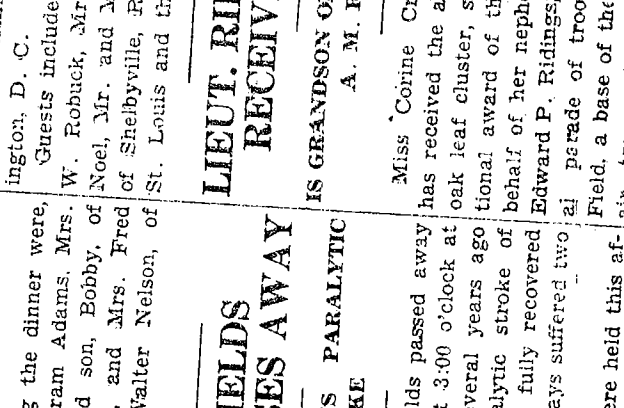

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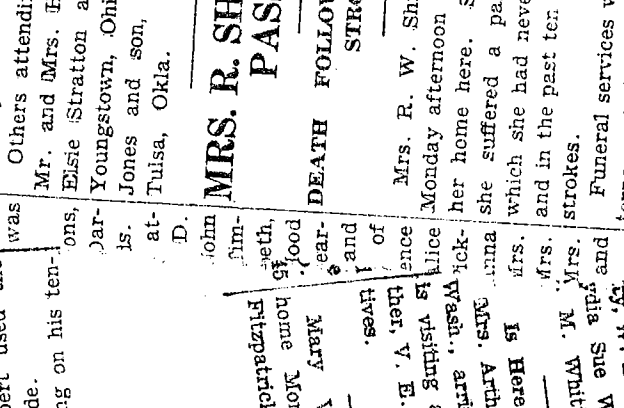
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MRS. R. SHIELDS PASSES AWAY
