Of Dr. George F. Brewington



Dr. George Franklin Brewington, physician for more than 58 years, succumbed to pneumonia December 7 in a Los Angeles hospital following a brief illness. He suffered a fall on Monday before Thanksgiving and seemed to be recovering from the resultant shock and pneumonia coupled with his advanced age of ninety-six years, provided fatal.

Dr. Brewington is survived by three daughters, Miss Ann Brewington, member of the faculty of Nevada Southern University; Miss Frances Brewington, public school nurse at Boulder City; and Mrs. Van Phelan, his son-in-law, former governor of Utah. He has one brother, W. B. Brewington, of Clarence, and several nieces and nephews.

Deceased was born in Clarence, Missouri, November 25, 1863. Early in his career, he taught school and later completed his medical training at St. Joseph, Missouri.

During World War I, Dr. Brewington served as an officer in the 88th Central Postal Directory, Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia. Following World War II, he was awarded a Presidential citation for his medical services.

Following World War II, he located in Missouri. In 1928, the Brewingtons moved to Michigan where he was associated with the Calumet & Hecla Mining Corporation until his retirement in 1946. For several years they spent the summer in their home in Michigan and the winter in milder climates. In 1950, they moved to Las Vegas, Nevada permanently.

Professionally, deceased was a Macon Shrine, Elk Lodge and an American Legionnaire in recognition of his services. He was awarded many years ago a Fifty Year Pin by the American Medical Association and one by the Masonic Order. He was a member of the Christian Church.

Masonic services were held Friday morning, Dec. 12, at 10 o'clock, at Bunkers Funeral Home, and interment was in Woodlawn cemetery in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Dwight Turner
Declared Dead
By Navy Dept.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Turner of this city have been notified by the U. S. Navy Department that their son, Dwight Harland Turner, who has been reported missing since October 1, 1958, has been officially presumed dead. According to a report, received by his parents this week it stated officially: "Dwight Harland Turner, who was officially reported missing 1 October 1958, pursuant to provisions of Section 5 P.L. 490, 77th Congress, as



amended, death presumed to have occurred on 2 Oct. 1959. The date of the report was October 2, 1959."

RM3 Turner enlisted in the United States Navy on February 23, 1955. An April 29, 1958, he re-enlisted and then just before he was reported missing he had enlisted for six more years. He was assigned to Taiwan Def. Comd. & MAAG, Taipei. He was reported missing last year after an aircraft accident at sea when he was a passenger aboard a commercial aircraft chartered by the Chinese Nationalists Government.

Dwight Harland Turner was born at Anabel, Mo., the son of Frank and Mertie H. Turner on February 12, 1938. He attended the Clarence Public Schools. Besides his parents, he is survived by two sisters, Shirley Jo Taylor of Clark, Mo., and Charlotte Buchanan of Labadie, Mo.
