Dr. J. Max Daniel, 53, a Kansas City optometrist and a native of Clarence, died Friday night as he was installing officers of the Orient Masonic lodge at the Masonic temple in Kansas City. His wife, Mrs. Ruth Daniel, was one of the 200 persons attending the ceremony.

Dr. Daniel had just completed the installation of Hardin W. Wood as worshipful master when he was stricken. A past master of the lodge, Dr. Daniel was acting as installing officer.

Dr. Daniel had been a member of the lodge since 1936 and was a master in 1944. The home is at 2110 East Forty-seventh street a terrace. Dr. Daniel had made special studies of vision at the Ohio State university and spoke at many optometric congresses on visual training. He was former president of the State Board of Optometry and the Missouri Optometric association.
