Word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hudson, telling of the death of his nephew, Pfc. L. C. Hudson.

According to a telegram received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Hudson, of Moberly, he was killed in action in the European theatre on April 28.

Pfc. Hudson, a member of a quartermaster corps, was 20 years old on the day he lost his life. He was a student in Moberly Junior College when he volunteered and entered service on February 10, 1943. He had been overseas, based in England, since January. He spent a furlough with his parents, shortly before leaving for overseas duty.

Prior to entering the service he was employed in the mailing department of the Moberly Monitor Index and later by the Gulick grocery store.

Pfc. Hudson was born in Kirksville and moved to Moberly with his parents when a small child. He was a member of the Trinity Methodist church. Besides his parents he is survived by his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Radcliff, of Moberly.
